01.28.05 - Jack T. Kimbrell, 83, of Sonoma, died Jan. 24, 2005, in Sonoma.

Mr. Kimbrell was born April 23, 1921, in Peoria, Ill. He graduated from Purdue University in 1943, and served in the U.S. Navy in World War II. In 1948, he received his master's degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Missouri, and he married Maxine Murphy. They moved to Pullman, Wash., where he taught mechanical engineering at Washington State University for 32 years. After retiring in 1986, the Kimbrells moved to Albuquerque, N.M., where they lived until moving to Sonoma seven years ago.

Mr. Kimbrell is survived by his wife of 56 years, Maxine; sons, James (Pamela) Kimbrell, of Pittsburgh, Michael (Jean) Kimbrell, of Huntington Beach; and a daughter, Ellen (Gary) Weadock, of Albuquerque, N.M. He will be missed by his grandchildren, Colin Kimbrell, Robin Kimbrell, Robert Anderson, Megan and Stewart Weadock; and his sister, Ellen Brinkman, of Sonoma.

A memorial service will be held at 11 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 29, at the Sonoma United Methodist Church, 109 E. Patten St. Interment in Pullman, Wash.

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In the Sonoma Valley Hospital emergency room, dad had decided not to have extraordinary measures taken should his heart stop beating, or should he stop breathing. Mom had to explain the question to him, and ask him what he would want to do if this should happen. He replied, "Tell 'em goodbye." Mom indicated to the doctor what she thought he meant. As soon as she said this, dad reached for her and said, "I'm sorry." Crying, mom said, "You don't have anything to be sorry about. You've been the best husband that anyone could ask for, and I love you so." After a few moments, dad turned to me and said, "You take care of your mother." I promised I would.

I was honored to be able to witness such a tender moment between my parents. That single exchange said more about their 56 years together than any memorial or set of photographs ever could.
